Your special Valentine's story ten years on, your kindness still wraps Bailey in her dad's love

Bailey was just two years old when her dad, Gary, was diagnosed with a brain tumor. Gifts from generous people like you helped create a video of them dancing in front of the castle at Disneyland before he died. Watching it today gives Bailey the strength to face life's challenges.

Bailey is a freshman in high school. Her mom, Jayme, says, "She takes after her dad and is super smart, getting straight A's."

But life has not been easy for Bailey. After losing her beloved father at such a young age, she was diagnosed with autism and Ehler's Danlos Syndrome, a progressive condition that requires her to use a wheelchair half the time.

For Bailey and Jayme, the video you made possible is a touching reminder of Gary's love and a precious record of the time before her diagnosis.

As Jayme says, "We didn't know that over the course of time when we would go back to visit the castle, she would go from dancing in front of it, to walking in pain by it, to having to use a wheelchair to go see it."

The video is also a source of inspiration. Bailey and Jayme still watch it regularly and turn to it for comfort when they are going through tough times, remembering how Gary faced adversity.

"The video not only reminds me that my dad loved me so much but also that he had the strength to get through his hard journey, so I can now be strong with mine."


"Gary was just a really good person," Jayme says. "If someone had a flat tire, he would stop to change it. If his friend was having a bad day, he would take them golfing so they could talk it out."

Gary put a lot of thought into what he wanted to do in his last year of life, creating the video for Bailey and even signing up to donate his organs, helping more than 25 people after his death. Jayme says, "He died a hero."

Jayme would like to hug everyone who made Gary's Dream possible, saying, "The people Dream Foundation helps can't be measured in numbers. Dreams are measured in moments."

She continues, "Each family they help creates hundreds, if not thousands, of moments. Moments that turn into memories for a lifetime. And even as life moves on to new moments and those turn into memories, the ones the Dream Foundation helps create have a lasting impact."
